

2017-2018 Graduate Fellowships in the College of Public Health and Human Sciences

Fellowships vary in amounts from \$250 to \$6,000, depending on the endowment and fluctuations in investment earnings. Approximately 35 fellowships were awarded for the 2016-2017 academic year. On application form, you will mark up to 3 fellowships for which you strongly qualify for. Note: Class standing refers to your status as of Fall term 2017.

Fellowships Available to Students in any CPHHS Academic Discipline

Gill-Hammond Fellowship for Students, Ruth: For a U.S. citizen. Preference given to students having a history of involvement in diverse communities.

Hawthorne Fellowship, Betty E.: For a student who demonstrates outstanding scholarly competence.

Heath, Kathleen F. and Edward H. Fund: For fellowships or scholarships for students in the College of Public Health and Human Sciences.

Koski Memorial Travel Award, Art: Awarded to an undergraduate or graduate student in good standing. The recipient should demonstrate a record of high academic achievement and show promise for an outstanding career in her/his chosen field. Intent is to cover costs related to attending any state, regional, national professional meeting or educational conference deemed appropriate by the College of Health and Human Sciences. *Graduate students must be presenting research/scholarship at the meeting.* Fill out Art Koski application form.

Milam Clark Fellowship, Ava: For an international graduate student.

Schad, Warren & Frederica: Awarded to an undergraduate or graduate student majoring in pre-medicine or pre-nursing (first preference) or other health-related program of study (second preference). First preference given to students who graduated from Elkton, Drain or Yoncalla high school.

Schild-Nicholson Fellowship: For a student with evidence of community and campus service and good academic standing.

Thayer Raymond Fellowship: For a student at the research stage in a graduate program. Application needs to include an abstract of your proposed research including the anticipated date of completion.

Trusty Fellowship, Francis and Phyllis: For a US citizen. Evidence of activities and work experience, pursuing a teaching career or undertaking family-related research.

Warnke, Ruth E. Graduate Fellowship: Awarded to a DHHS PhD candidate involved in research and/or writing period of dissertation and/or publication. Must submit a “plan of work” with timeline, based on your approved dissertation research proposal. Student must be full-time (9 credits) during academic year of award. **(fill out separate application form specifically for Warnke)**

Woods/Foster Fellowship: For a student in any graduate program in the PHS disciplines.

Zimmerman Gerontology Fellowship, Josephine: For a U.S. citizen with a concentration in Gerontology; preference given to students with prior work-related experiences and evidence of financial need.

Human Development and Family Sciences Discipline Fellowships

Dubois, May Memorial Thesis or Dissertation Grant: Awarded to MS or PhD candidates who have completed two-thirds of hours in the program including a Research Methods course.

Fang, Cynthia Memorial Scholarship: Awarded to an undergraduate or graduate student majoring in family and consumer sciences, 3.25 cum gpa, preference first to international students. May be renewed for successive years, current recipient must reapply.

Gravatt, Authur E. Fellowship: For student in Human Development and Family Studies.

Home Economics Graduate Fellowship: For student who plans to teach, do research, work in extension or outreach, go into business leadership or social agency administrator.

Human Development and Family Sciences Fellowship: For a graduate student in Human Development and Family Sciences.

Mockmore Scholarship, Buena Marris (formerly Steinmetz): For junior, senior or graduate student with scholastic competence and evidence of intent to continue in the field of child development or family relationships. Need for financial aid may be considered, but shall not be the sole or major condition.

Sonin Scholarship Fund: For deserving undergrad and graduate students studying in the area of Family Studies.

Weatherspoon, Joni Memorial Scholarship: For graduate student who is a female, Latina student.

Kinesiology Discipline Fellowships

Maksud, George and Rachel, Fellowship in Exercise Physiology: For a doctoral student with a concentration in exercise physiology. Wherever possible, the fellowship is to be awarded to a candidate who is first generation college graduate.

Nutrition Discipline Fellowships

Charley, Helen Fellowship in Foods and Nutrition: For a student majoring in Nutrition and Food Management with an emphasis in Foods and evidence of financial need.

Lindsay, Annie McDonald Fellowship: For seniors or graduate students in Nutrition and Food Management with an option in Dietetics or Nutrition Science. Documentation needs to include why you chose the nutrition profession.

Nutrition Science Fellowship: For students entering the PhD program with preference to Oregon residents.

Reynolds, Patricia A. Nutrition Student Support Fund: Graduate student in Nutrition.

Richardson, Elsie Crail Nutrition Student Support Fund: Provide support to graduate and undergraduate students who demonstrate high academic achievement in Nutrition. Award is renewable but recipients must re-apply each year and go through the qualifying process.

Rohlfing, Jewell Fields Fellowship: For a student in Nutrition and Food Management. Must have financial need; can be a part-time student.

Tartar, Ruth Award: For a student in Nutrition and Food Management. Research proposal including budget and expected date of completion should be included in documentation. Proposals can be submitted to the Head of Nutrition Discipline Office of NFM by the last day of each quarter for consideration.

Woodburn, Margy J. Fellowship: For a student in Nutrition and Food Management; preference given to entering student. Student may be full or part-time.

Public Health Fellowships

Rossignol, Anne Fellowship in Public Health: For a full or part-time student in any Public Health discipline with a 3.0 cumulative GPA, making satisfactory progress toward degree and demonstrated commitment to ethics and issues of social justice. May be US citizen or international citizen.

Wood, Liam Memorial Scholarship: Full-time student majoring in Environmental Health and Safety with cumulative GPA of 3.25 or above. Financial need may be considered, but is not required.
