## How do Oregon's child care facilities meet the needs of children across income levels?

### **Oregon Child Care Subsidy** What is it?

A program that helps eligible low-income families pay for child care when they are working by covering a portion of the total cost of child care. For more information on eligibility and application, visit the Oregon Department of Human Services Child Care Assistance Site.

### **Integration** Why?

Integration of children from all income groups in early learning programs is more likely to meet the needs of all children, especially those from low-income families.

### **Child Care Facilities** What types are there?

- Small Home-based: Serve up to 10 children in provider's home
- Large Home-based: Serve up to 16 children in a single-family home
- Centers: Typically located in commercial buildings. The number of children served is license-dependent

## **Facilities that Serve Children on Subsidy** What is the Status?

In December 2022, there were over 15,300 children whose parents received a child care subsidy. Findings below highlight how the needs of these low-income families are being met through subsidized child care.

\*In 2022, what percent of child care facilities served at least one child whose family receives a subsidy?







\*In 2022, what percent of facilities predominantly served children on subsidy? Only a minority of facilities have more than 50% of the facility's desired capacity filled by subsidized children.

- 21% of Small Home-based facilities
- 26% of Large Home-based facilities
- 2% of Centers
